

Gardening on BFI Replay

From tiny gardening to giant marrows, and from hand-painted gnomes to homegrown tobacco, this green-fingered selection from <u>BFI Replay</u> provides a glimpse into gardens past.

Two Backyards in Beeston Hill (2001)

A hopeful and optimistic film about the difference two small gardens have made to the lives of Beeston residents. This video looks at the run-down housing and property of Beeston Hill, Leeds. Three young boys have helped a resident restore her garden - first described as a tip, now full of flowers and winner of honourable mention for Beeston in Bloom.

There's No Business like Gnomes Business (1990s)

Make your garden home to a gnome! The Noels family set up Donegore Arts Centre. One evening, they came up with an ingenious business idea: garden gnomes. They now employ 52 people in the Templepatrick area and are still expanding, with an aim to employ up to 50 people. All of the statues are handmade and handpainted, with most sold in England at £40 a piece.

Gardening By Computer (About Anglia, 1983)

Greenfinger computer software to help with garden planning and plant selection is demonstrated by its developer, Norman Sandland.

Tiny Garden (TSW News, 1987)
